A violinist once performed in the New York City subway, entertaining passersby for 45 minutes. A few tossed him cash, totaling about \$30 by the time he concluded.

Little did anyone know, Joshua Bell was one of the world's best violinists. That day, he played one of the most complex musical pieces ever written on an instrument worth \$3.5 million. Indeed, a few days earlier Bell had performed a sold-out concert in Boston, where tickets averaged \$100.

But upon taking part, you find it leads to your life's calling. Or someone crosses your path, but overlooking their worth, you brush them aside, missing out on a blessing God had for you through them.

And what about you? Do you undervalue yourself as "nothing special," just an "ordinary" person? Look closer; think again. For an ordinary baby born long ago to an ordinary couple in an ordinary stable in an ordinary town was none other than ... God's Son! And you? Why, you are also an extraordinary child of God!

PASTOR'S Ponderings

Does being at church - in church - matter?

I heard a recent interview in which the interviewer praised a political figure for being willing to address hard questions. This is one of those hard questions because in part the role of the church has changed a lot in recent decades.

In the past the local church was a depository of information and for education about the Christian faith. The local church was the place where you could go to learn about Jesus, or the Holy Spirit, or the Trinity, or what it meant to live as a disciple (follower of Jesus). We had Sunday Schools that were overflowing and sermons that were more theologically centered.

But we no longer need a local church to teach us about Christian faith; that knowledge is as close as our computer, tablet, and phone. We can join podcasts where scriptures are taught and sermons are shared.

So no. We don't need the church for these things, not that they don't have some value.

What the local church is still good at is connections. At our best, we are bringing people together with one another and with God. What the local church is still good at is celebrating life's milestones and accomplishments and holding each other's hand in difficult time. What the local church is still good at is encouraging each other to grow, not just in faith, but in our capacity for finding meaning in life and sharing life with others.

Psychologists are telling us that there is an epidemic of loneliness in the world today. The church is a place where people can connect.

When thinking about being at church, remember that the church is not a place of perfect people but of human beings with all their flaws, just trying to be better and find some encouragement and purpose along the way.

In the Book of Acts, we see a picture of the first Christian Church where people are coming together to figure out how to live like Jesus, sharing meals together, and taking time to make sure each other had what they needed for life and living. This more than anything is why being at church matters.

May we be the kind of church where people are welcomed, life is celebrated, and we find purpose.

Lift Update

Good progress is being made on the installation of the new lift. Don Smith and his brother Jerry have completed the work of expanding the opening between the Fellowship Hall ceiling and Overflow Room floor. (Thanks guys!) The lift was scheduled to be shipped from the manufacturer in Canada to Access Elevator and Lifts in Des Moines the end of the August. Our hope is that the new lift will be installed by the middle of September.

One of the jobs we have is that of **greeter**. The greeter arrives 15-20 minutes before Sunday worship to greet people, 'Good morning! How are you?' Give them a bulletin, and let them know about things like following worship on the screens or where the bathroom or nursery is (if they are visiting). The greeter closes the doors to the sanctuary at the beginning of worship.

After worship, the greeter opens the doors to sanctuary during the last hymn. As people are leaving, the greeter checks the pews, puts any hymnals or Bibles back in the pew racks, tears out the signed attendances sheets and gives them to Dan Saunders.

This job is filled one Sunday at a time so this commitment is just for the date you sign up on. It can be one person or a group of folks. There are always people around to help if you have questions.
