### **Clothed in Compassion**

In Colossians 3:12, Paul tells us to clothe ourselves in compassion. What does that look like? Consider these parallels to actual clothes:

Each morning, we select outfits depending on our activities and who we'll see. For example, clothing looks different for a day of chores than for worship on Easter Sunday. To maintain our wardrobe, we regularly clean, fold and repair items. Likewise, each day we choose how we'll treat others. Our approach to each activity or interaction might differ, as we seek to



represent Christ well. And to maintain an effective witness, we often must renew and "mend" our attitude.

One more comparison: Look in your closet. Have you updated your clothes lately? Compassion looks different than it did decades ago. While staying grounded in biblical truth, let's adapt the care we wear — making it "fit" better for today's generations.

Wisdom says that April showers bring May flowers.

The apostle Paul, when writing to the church in Corinth, talks about the progression that is necessary for things like flowers to grow. The seed has to be planted and then watered. Only then, God willing, will that seed begin to grow, take root, flower, and bear fruit.

In April, Lent will give way to Easter. Lent, we might say, is the season of preparing the ground and planting the seed, while Easter is the season where those plants grown and bear fruit. If we have done the work of Lent (examining our faith, seeing what needs pruning or nurturing), we would think that the season of Easter would be one of abundant harvest...but God always surprises us. Growth comes in unexpected places and unexpected ways. God growth is not dependent on us. It is God who initiates, God who waters, God who brings the fruit to the plant. But yet we do have a role, a part to play.

In April, we will celebrate what God is doing and what we are doing.

On April 4th, we will gather to celebrate communion and to ask God to bless the soil and the seeds as farmers prepare to go to the fields to plant the crops.

On April 13th, our confirmands will lead us in the Palm Sunday service, profess their faith, and be received into the membership of the church.

On April 20th, we will celebrate Easter...'Christ is risen, He is risen indeed'.

May these services be an encouragement to you and I as we grow in our faith. May our faith bear an abundance of kindness and compassion as we live it out in our homes, our work, our school, our community, and our world.

#### Blessing of Seed and Soil, Sunday, April 6th

The service of Blessing of Seed and Soil is also known as Rogation Sunday. I learned about Rogation Sunday when I was in seminary in Dubuque through a rural ministry class. Rogation, the practice of offering prayers and fasting in order to beseech God's blessing on seed, soil, and harvest has been around since the 6th Century. Today it is more widely practiced in the Roman Catholic or Anglican traditions but Protestants have adapted the practice to fit their worship as well.




During worship on April 6th, we will gather to ask God to bless the seed and soil. We will ask God to bless and keep safe those who work the land and tend the animals that feed us.

It takes all of us pitching in to make the church not only work, but work in the way it was intended.

"Each person is given something to do that shows who God is: Everyone gets in on it, everyone benefits. All kinds of things are handed out by the Spirit, and to all kinds of people!"

Each month I have been trying to remind us of how the church in general, and this church specifically, needs every one pitching in and contributing, to make 'church' work. I have talked about things like helping out in worship, or serving as an elder or deacon, or offering hospitality, or taking time to clean up those things that need attention. This month I want to talk about our financial giving.

One of the most important ways that we contribute to the whole is through our financial giving and generosity. It takes all of us, each doing our part, to provide for the financial well being of the church.

The church's budget expenses this year are just over \$208,000. Our anticipated income is budgeted at just over \$169,000. Of this budgeted income amount we anticipate about \$95,000 of giving (weekly offerings and per capita gifts) and \$74,000 through what I would call generosity (the endowments, scholarship funds, Pie Committee contributions, special offerings, and fund raising).

Our budget is not extravagant. There is not a lot for spending on others (Mission). It basically pays the pastor and employees, keeps the building heated and cooled, and covers the insurance. (These items make up approximately 82% of our budget.)

Our giving is like a lot of things we do as the church, some of us are able to give more and some of us able to give less, but when we are all doing what we can it makes the church work the way that God intended it to.

\*The Monticello Food Pantry is serving the community Mondays (5 p.m.-7 p.m.) and Fridays (2 p.m.-4 p.m.).

\*If you are able, consider donating to those in need. You can donate products, or consider a monetary donation. DID YOU KNOW?: When the Food Pantry receives monetary donations, they use this for needs not filled by HACAP, and those purchases are made locally (Fareway & Dollar Fresh) and are bought by the case at a discounted case pricing, so they are able to purchase more with the money you donate. Thank you!

\*If you have a donation (product or monetary), those can be brought to the Food Pantry during normal operating hours (Mondays from 5 pm-7 pm and Fridays from 2 pm-4pm), or a half hour before. Monetary donations can be left with the check-in volunteer located in the church. For product donations, please knock on the Food Pantry door and our volunteers would be glad to help you drop off. We will be serving people during this time, so we appreciate your patience.

Food Pantry currently has needs, should you be able to pick up an extra item or two, or more, the next time you head to the store: Canned fruits and vegetables, muffin mixes, cake mixes, soup, cereal (no Cheerios of any kind), regular sized shampoos, laundry detergent, and regular sized toothpastes.

- 1. Transferred \$31,021.25 from Capital Building fund to checking to make down payments to Glass heritage \$20,321.25, and Rabe Hardware \$10,700.
- 2. Transferred Bazaar account to checking \$2,366.24. Closed Bazaar account.
- 3. Transferred \$6,000 from Corporate Trust accounting to checking. Renamed Corporate Trust account Emergency Fund account.

Where to get money? Above \$2,253.13 + \$1,049.00 to be received late April and late August from Marugg interest + \$3,302.13. Transfer \$7,771.42 from Memorial savings to cover cost. That still leaves \$21,352.38 in Memorial savings.
